

Truth #7: Being an instrument of change means speaking the truth in love, With the gospel as comfort and call, we can help people to see themselves in God's Word and lead them to repentance (Romans 8:1-17; Galatians 6:1-2; James 1:22-25). Lessons 9-10 p. 127SG

- Rebuke is the word the Bible uses for bringing truth to where change is needed, yet most of us don't react positively when we hear it...When we think of rebuke, we think of harsh words, red faces, ultimatums, and threats. We don't think of an act of patient and committed love. p. 200B
- 2. Start with ourselves. If we are going to speak as ambassadors, we affirm that biblical truth-speaking always begins with dealing with our own hearts. We need to confess and forsake all the wrong thoughts and motives (anger, bitterness, thoughts of vengeance, a spirit of condemnation, etc.) that would stand in the way of what the Lord wants to do through us. And we must ask God to provide the love, courage, patience, and wisdom that we will need to represent him well. This step of personal preparation is often neglected in moments of confrontation. The result is that the rebuke is not effective, not only because the receiver was unwilling but also because the representative was unprepared. If we do not start with our own hearts we will tend to: (a) Turn moments of ministry into moments of anger (b) Personalize things that are not personal (c) Be adversarial in our approach (d) Confuse our opinions with God's will (e) Settle for quick solutions that do not address the heart. 93SG Humbly embrace the fact that the Wonderful Counselor is working on everybody involved... No one is more ready to communicate God's grace than someone who has faced his own desperate need for it. p. 211B
- 3. Why is our heart preparation important? Why are courage & patience needed?
- 4. Understand why people need to be confronted.

 because of: (a) The deceitfulness of sin, which blinds our hearts (Hebrews 3:12-13)
 (b) Wrong and unbiblical thinking (Numbers 11; Psalm 73) (c) Emotional thinking
 (we are all aware that we don't do our best thinking in times of great emotion; we will
 often be ministering to people who are in the midst of situations that are emotionally
 volatile) (d) Our view of life (God, self, others, the solution, etc.) tends to be
 strengthened by our experiences. Because we are the one interpreting our
 experiences our conclusions tend to be reinforced with each new situation. What we
 need is an intervention of truth to confront and correct our thinking. p. 94SG
- 5. How is bringing The Truth (& biblical thinking) to someone's attention loving them?

- 6. **Speak with God's goals in view.** p. 94SG Our loving, honest rebuke can be equal to these challenges only if we pursue two goals. The first is to be used as one of God's instruments of seeing in the lives of others. I am not trying to advance my own opinion. I want to help people see themselves in the mirror of God's Word. I want to help them see what God sees. The second is to be used by God as an agent of repentance. The biblical definition of repentance is a change of heart that leads to a change in the direction of my life... Our goal is not to pressure people into behavioral changes, but to encourage heart change that impacts the life. p. 212-213B
- 7. My **goal** is that **through** the things I say (message), the way I say them (methods), and the attitudes I express (character), **God will change the heart** of this person... You have a *kingdom worker* identity. You have been chosen to pursue relationships with a sense of *redemptive calling*. p. 213B
- 8. How do we partner with God as we speak the truth of God's Word into someone?
- 9. A mistake we often make when we seek to lead someone to repentance is to emphasize the law over the gospel. Yet Paul says (Rom. 2:4) that it is God's kindness (goodness) that leads us to repentance. He also says (2 Cor. 5:14) that it is the love of Christ that compels us to no longer live for ourselves, but for him. The grace of the gospel is what turns our hearts, because the gospel is God's magnificent promise of forgiveness in Christ. This draws us out of hiding into the light of truth, where true confession and repentance can take place. p. 213B
- 10. Confronting people should not only confront them with failure and sin, it should also confront them with the gospel. We cannot forget this! We need to remind people of their **identity in Christ** (2 Peter 1:3-9; 1 John 3:1-3). We need to remind them of God's **amazing promise of forgiveness** (1 John 1:5-10), and the wonderful gift of the **indwelling Holy Spirit** (Eph. 3:20), who gives us strength to obey. These truths give believers the **courage to examine** their **hearts, confess** their **sin**, and **turn to Christ**. p. 213-214B

Romans 8:1-17

- 11. Paul begins by alerting us of the comfort of the gospel (vv. 1-11)... The Lord Jesus Christ has removed the sentence of condemnation... Jesus paid the penalty for our sin. p. 95SG ...The gospel also comforts us with the Holy Spirit... God lives inside us... The Spirit has come to give us life, power, and the desire and ability to obey. p. 96SG
- 12. Self-examination and confession flow out of a deep confidence that **Christ's work is effective for me today**. I come to Him confident that He forgives me. p. 215B
- 13. Paul says that the gospel is also a call. The call of the gospel is summarized by Paul in vv. 12-17. Paul uses the word obligation to define what the gospel calls us to. He essentially says that the ongoing work of God in the believers' lives is to eradicate sin ("put to death the misdeeds of the body"). p. 97SG
- 14. The heart that has embraced both the hope (comfort) and the obligation (call) can receive honest words of confrontation. The person can see the gravity of his sin and the grandeur of God's call to obey in light of gospel truths. p. 217
- 15. True biblical confrontation confronts people with much more than their sins and failures. It confronts people with Christ. **He really is "the Way, the Truth, and the Life!" Hope for change always rests on Him**. p. 218B
- 16. Why does rebellion & sin make us uncomfortable? How do Christ's work on the cross, Christ's power in the resurrection and The Spirit's presence give us comfort?

Truth #7: Being an instrument of change means speaking the truth in love, With the gospel as comfort and call, we can help people to see themselves in God's Word and lead them to repentance (Romans 8:1-17; Galatians 6:1-2; James 1:22-25). Lessons 9-10 p. 127SG

- 1. Every situation, conversation, relationship, trial, or blessing belongs to Him... People who approach life this way are ready to serve as God's instruments of change. They see beyond their own agenda and are motivated by His. p. 222B
- 2. Our goal is to do more than read people a list of charges from Scripture or tell them what we think of them. We want to **help people understand what is wrong** and lead them to repentance. To that end, we will consider four steps in the confrontation process. p. 222B 1. Consideration 2. Confession 3. Commitment 4. Change
- 3. CONSIDERATION: The question to ask yourself is, "What does this person need to see (about himself, God, others, life, truth, change) that he does not see, and how can I help him see it?" ... Our goal is not to communicate a list of offenses, but to help people see themselves. Often when people tell their story, they are not in it! They focus on the difficulties of the situation and the attitudes and behavior of others. They don't include their own thoughts, desires, choices, and actions. While we are sensitive to the realities of suffering and being sinned against, our goal is to encourage people to look at their behavior and examine their hearts... p. 223B
- 4. How have you seen people focus on the difficulties of the situation, the attitudes of others, the behavior of others as opposed to focusing on their own thoughts & actions?
- 5. Five questions can help people see what God wants them to see. The order is important because it teaches us to think biblically about why we do the things we do and how God changes us. The questions are appropriate for young children and mature adults and for informal and formal (personal) ministry. p. 223B
- 6. (1) What was going on? This question focuses on the situations or circumstances that people are facing. Their responses are important for two reasons. First, you want them to see that circumstances did not force them to do what they did. Second, you want to understand the details of their world in order to speak truth into it. p. 224B
- 7. (2) What were you thinking and feeling as it was going on? This question takes people's eyes off the situation & asks them to examine their hearts (thoughts)... We are never just victims, but incessant interpreters whose interpretations precede and shape our actions. We... experience powerful emotions that direct our behavior. p. 224

- 6. (3) What did you do in response? This question comes after the question above because **our behavior is shaped by our heart's response to the situation**. p. 224B
- 7. By asking this question at this time, you help people to admit that their behavior was not forced by the situation ("It was the only thing I could do!") or by others ("She makes me so angry!"). (Without this connection), people revert to blame-shifting. 224B
- 8. If we fail to **expose the connection between interpretation and response**, we give Satan a huge opportunity. He is the teller of plausible **lies**... Satan works with partial & distorted truths. His lies have power because they begin with something true. p. 224B
- 9. Help people...see that their behavior reveals more about their own hearts... 225B
- 10. (4) Why did you do it? What were you seeking to accomplish? (reveal motives) p. 225B
- 11. Human life is one big treasure hunt. We all have things that are valuable to us (acceptance, possessions, achievement, a certain lifestyle, God's glory, vengeance, love, independence, health). In some way, we all seek to get those things from our situations & relationships. Our behavior always expresses these motives...idols. 225B
- 12. Biblical personal ministry always moves toward issues of glory & worship. The most basic question in all personal ministry is, "For whose glory are you living?" 226
- 13. (5) What was the result? ... We need to help people examine the fruit in their lives & see the connection between their harvest and the thoughts & motives of their hearts.
- 14. We want to be used by God to give people two things. The first is a <u>harvest mentality</u>, where people understand that **every day they plant seeds & harvest fruit from the seeds they have planted**. The second is an <u>investment mentality</u> that acknowledges Christ's teaching that **our lives are shaped by the treasure in which we invest**. 226-227B
- 15. As long as people are willing to be part of the **process**, you can work to **refocus their** attention toward the heart and its fruit. p. 227
- 16. CONFESSION: If people have looked at themselves in the mirror of Scripture, they should have identified sins of heart and behavior that needs to be confessed. p. 228B
- 17. True confession flows out of worship and results in a deeper, fuller worship of God. As Christ's ambassadors, we seek to lead people to speak humble, specific words of confession to the Lord. We also need to encourage them to identify people who have been affected by their sins and seek their forgiveness. We should lead them to pray, to admit their sin, and to seek God's forgiveness and help. p. 229B
- 18. We have to deal with our own hearts as well... we too are sinners. p. 229B
- 19. COMMITMENT: Don't soften God's call for concrete commitments of heart and life. People's commitments should be God-ward and not simply horizontal bargains with the goal of an easier, better life. God is worthy of their worship even if their circumstances remain the same...If the person has lived for her own glory, a new way of living must be rooted in a zeal for God's glory & a resolve to live for Him. p. 230B
- 20. CHANGE: It is easy to assume that change has taken place because the person has gained insight & made new commitments. This may tempt us to stop the confrontation process prematurely. But change has not taken place until change has taken place!

 Change—not personal insight or commitment—is the goal of confrontation. p. 231B
- 21. Truth that is not spoken in love ceases to be truth because it is twisted by other agendas. Love that is not guided by truth ceases to be love because it is divorced from God's agenda. p. 232

Truth #8: Being an instrument of change means **helping people do what God calls them to do** by clarifying responsibility, offering loving accountability, and reminding them of their identity in Christ (Galatians 6:2; Philippians 2:1-14; 2 Peter 1:3-9; 1 John 3:1-3). Lessons 11-12 p. 127SG

- 1. Change always demands a deeper understanding of the things of God and a more careful application of those truths to our lives. Since change is a lifelong process, it won't be over until we are in the presence of the Lord. So, as we encourage people to change, dealing with the needs of the moment is not our highest priority; rather, it is answering God's call to "Be holy, because I am holy" (Lev. 11:44). As we call people to do what God has called them to do, we must keep this ultimate destination in view. p. 239B
- 2. We tend to be shortsighted and self-absorbed. We forget that God's primary goal is not changing our situation and relationships so that we can be happy, but changing us through our situations and relationships so that we will be holy. We need people who love God and us enough to come alongside and help us deal with our spiritual myopia. p. 241B
- 3. We do want people to see, know and understand, but we also want them to **apply** that insight **to** their **daily life**. God opens our eyes so that, in seeing Him, we would **follow Him more closely**... personal ministry should not end too soon. p. 243B
- 4. We all need people to stand alongside us as we apply God's Word to our lives. 243
- 5. The final aspect of our model, **Do**, teaches us how to apply truths we have learned, personal insights we have gained, and commitments we have made, to our daily lives. Here we teach people to be dissatisfied with the gap between their confessional and functional theology. We lead them to live out their identity as children of God, claiming the rights and privileges of the gospel. **Do** trains people in the decisions, actions, relationships, and skills of Christ-centered, biblically informed living. We have a wonderful opportunity not only to teach people how to solve their problems biblically, but to turn their lives around for the long run. p. 243-244B
- 6. Why do you agree or disagree that "change is a lifelong process?"
- 7. What role do action steps have in "applying truths we have learned?"
- 8. Why would it be exciting for you to help others do what God has called them to do?
- 9. 1. <u>Establishing Your Personal Ministry Agenda</u>: A plan or map provides a clear sense of direction. 2. <u>Clarifying Responsibility</u>: As people apply truth to life, the issue of who is responsible for what will always arise. 3. <u>Instill Identity in Christ</u> 4. <u>Provide Accountability</u>

- 10. Establishing Your Personal Ministry Agenda An agenda is simply a plan for accomplishing a goal, a map that shows us our destination (the changes that need to take place) and how to get there (How? Where? When? With whom?). p. 245B
- 11. We need to apply the principles, perspectives, commands, and themes of God's great redemptive story to the concrete realities of a person's life. We cannot leave people to themselves or advise them from a distance. Yet all too often, our ministry is weakest here. We fail to recognize that, on their own, people often have a hard time applying biblical truths to their lives. We need to establish a biblical sense of direction (agenda) for our ministry at this stage. p. 245-246B
- 12. God has chosen us to be his ambassadors in this person's life! The Holy Spirit is enlivening the person's heart and empowering our words. The Savior is loving and changing others through us. **Nothing we can do is more important** or will have more lasting results. In view of the holiness of our calling, we should not speak without preparation. We should ask questions that help us think clearly about how to accomplish God's goals for change in this person. 246B
- 13. What are God's goals for change for this person (in general) in this situation? This question applies God's call to "put off" and "put on" (Eph. 4:22-24) to the specifics of a person's thoughts, motives, and behavior. What does God want her to think, desire, do? Answering this question marks out our destination... I must only lead people where God is calling them. p. 247B
- 14. This question takes the general commands, themes, perspectives, and principles of Scripture and fashions them into specific steps of change. p. 247B
- 15. The Bible presents a **lifestyle** that is **radical**ly different... The Bible not only lays out a surprising **picture** of what is wrong with us, but a surprising agenda for correction. 248
- 16. When we actually apply biblical perspectives to people's daily lives, they rearrange them from the inside out. p. 249B
- 17. Clarifying Responsibility ... The Christian life can really be boiled down to two words: trust and obey. I must always entrust the things that are out of my control to God (Circle of Concern), and I must always be faithful to obey his clear and specific commands (Circle of responsibility). p. 255B (Figure 13:1 p. 250B & p. 354B)

Romans 12:14-21 is a wonderful passage to explain this "trust and obey."

- 18. What is powerful about this passage is that it lays out the "trust and obey" lifestyle in the context of mistreatment. God clearly explains our duties in the face of wrong treatment: a. Bless those who persecute you (v. 14). b. Be tender and compassionate (v. 15). c. Commit to living in harmony (v. 16). d. Do not be proud (v. 16). e. As far as you can, live at peace with everyone (v. 19). f. Meet your enemy's need (v. 20). g. Overcome evil with good (v. 21). In making my responsibilities under mistreatment clear, Paul also makes it clear that there are things that I must not take as my responsibility. p. 256
- 19. At the same time, it is wrong to be passive in the face of mistreatment, waiting around for God to do something. **God calls us to be obediently active**, looking for ways to do good, make peace, and meet needs. In the process, we continue to entrust the person who has wronged us to God's just and merciful hands. In short, **we must do what God has called us to do** in a spirit of joyful submission, and, in a spirit of humble trust, **let God do what he alone can do**. p. 256
- 20. Do you have a plan to help others do what God has called them to do? How can CCBC help you with a plan for this? Why does the word "agenda" sound intentional?

- 1. This chapter examines the fact that encouragement and accountability are important parts of the truth application process... God designed us to live in community, first with Him and then with one another... It is in the process of change that we really begin to see our need for one another... God created us to be (inter)dependent on each other to live life righteously, just as he created us to be dependent on his revelation to interpret life accurately. p. 259
- 2. How have you benefited from the encouragement and/or accountability of others?
- 3. 1. Establishing Your Personal Ministry Agenda 2. Clarifying Responsibility 3. Instill Identity in Christ: Change is a hard process, and people need to be reminded of the resources that are theirs as children of God. 4. Provide Accountability: Change demands patience and perseverance, so we all need the encouragement, insight, and warning that a system of oversight provides.
- 4. <u>3. Instill Identity in Christ</u> People need encouragement as they pursue the hard work of change. They need truths that will motivate and strengthen them. p. 259
- 5. Scripture lays out this new identity for us. We learn that we are not only forgiven, but have in fact been adopted into the family of God. We are children of the King of Kings. The God of the universe is our Father! p. 260
- 6. "In Christ" means that we have been fully united to Him and received all He has promised us... We have life because we are "in" the Vine. p. 260
- 7. As people pursue the process of lifelong change, they need to **live out of a gospel identity**. They, like us, need to be reminded of who they are again and again. p. 260
- 8. There is a radical difference between saying, "I am a depressed person," and saying, "I am a child of God 'in Christ' and I tend to struggle with depression." p. 260 ... "Yes, I wrestle with depression every day, but I am not alone. I do not rest on my own strength and wisdom." p. 261
- 9. It is never a waste of time to **remind people of who they are in Christ**. Doing so stimulates hope, courage, and faith. p. 261
- 10. Why do we forget who we are in Christ?


- **2 Peter 1:3-9** a. There will be people who know the Lord, but whose lives are ineffective and unproductive. (v. 8) p. 261... b. These people do not produce the expected fruit because they are missing essential character qualities (faith, goodness, knowledge, self-control, perseverance, godliness, brotherly kindness, and love). But Christ lived, died, and rose so that they would possess these qualities. (v. 5-8) c. These people have lost sight of their identity in Christ, so they do not realize the resources that are theirs. (v. 9) d. Another significant aspect of our identity is that in Christ we have been given "everything we need for life and godliness." (v. 3) p. 262... God's purpose is not that we would be personally happy (nice job, marriage, family, church, neighborhood, vacation, retirement), but that we would become participants in His divine nature. (v. 4) p. 264... e. When we start living out of our identity in Christ, it will change the way we live. We will not settle for a little bit of Christian character. We will not see our relationships and situations as dangers to be avoided, but as opportunities to experience what already belongs to us in Christ. (v. 5-8) p. 265
- 12. Each day we will want to experience more of the resources that are ours as children of God. This expectant, progressive model of change is critical for people applying new insights and commitments to their lives. p. 266... Peter ties our ability to persevere through difficulties to our grasp of our identity in Christ and the resources that come with it... He has promised to progressively conform our sinful hearts to the likeness of our Savior, Jesus Christ. As we apply new insights and make new commitments, this is the identity we need... We need to be continually reminded of our status as children of God and our spiritual resources in Christ. p. 267
- 13. Provide Accountability The biblical picture (of accountability) is very loving in at least two ways. a. As we help restore people to where God wants them to be, we are called to "carry each others burdens" (Gal. 6:2). b. We are told to fight the deceitfulness of sin by "encouraging one another daily." (Heb. 3:13). p. 268
- 14. Like all personal ministry, **accountability** is incarnational. By standing alongside people, we incarnate the presence of the Holy Spirit who is not only *with* them but *in* them. We preach the gospel of an ever-present Redeemer who doesn't just command, but enables. He doesn't just convict, he forgives and restores. **Biblical accountability** is not fearful, abusive, or intrusive. It is **loving**, **sacrificial**, ambassadorial, incarnational and holy. p. 269
- 15. Accountability provides loving a. structure, b. guidance, c. assistance d. encouragement, and e. warning to someone who is fully committed to the change God is working in his life. The person who makes accountability work is always the person being held accountable. p. 269
- 16. Accountability brings ongoing help to the person who is fully committed to the "put off/put on" process. Ask yourself three questions as you seek to provide such accountability: a. 


